
Career Bliss:

Technology.

Humans are behind the automation of countless processes, and humans are needed to research, develop, create and troubleshoot the many technological tools that make our modern lives possible.

Health Care.

Human bodies need good medical care throughout life, and when we need care (and comfort), we seek out other humans to provide it.

Finance.

Expanding or shrinking, business requires financial planners, accountants and similar professionals who can track movement, make predictions and offer answers.



Our grandfathers may have been able to pull the same lever for decades—but today, workers who embrace the chance to learn new things and move up the career ladder demonstrate more job satisfaction than those who encounter roadblocks. Here are the growing industries offering the best growth potential, according to CareerBuilder:

Business and Financial Operations.

The desire to maintain a competitive edge is encouraging more growth (and improving pay) in this sector.

Information Technology.

Smartphones, smart homes, smart cars—IT professionals are behind it all, from research and development to troubleshooting customer concerns.

Health Care.

A growing (and aging) population always needs competent, caring professionals who can help address health concerns.

Skilled Trades.

The skilled trades saw 8 percent growth in 2016, equal to that in the business and IT sectors. As the economy grows, so does the need for individuals who can build, fix and maintain the necessary infrastructure.



Forbes and CareerBliss.com compiled and analyzed data from 43,000 independent employee reviews to find out who was happiest on the job. Workers ranked work relationships, workplace environments, resources, compensation, growth, culture and more.

Here's where to look for the happiest co-workers:

Government.

With an index score of 4.07, government workers rated the happiest at their jobs.

Education.

Teachers, administrators, and other educators landed at 4.06 on the happiness scale.

Wholesale and Distribution.

Warehouse personnel love their jobs too, rating a 3.98 overall.

Real Estate Construction.

These workers tied with warehouse personnel in rating their job happiness.

Telecommunications.

This rapidly growing, ever-changing industry ranked a 3.95.



They say money can't buy happiness, but it can provide stability and a better quality of life—and for some people, simply watching the bank balance grow is deeply satisfying. Here are the best-paying positions in the United States, according to Business Insider:

Anesthesiologist ranked #1, with an average annual salary just over \$250,000 and projected growth of 21 percent between 2014 and 2024. Certified registered nurse anesthetists also made the Top 20 list.

Surgeons ranked just behind anesthesiologists, which is unsurprising: the two often work on the same team. Physicians, pediatricians, psychiatrists and OB-GYNs also made the Top 20.

Orthodontists also ranked highly in the Business Insider list, as did dentists and prosthodontists, who specialize in oral prostheses.

Petroleum engineers focusing on creating new technology for tapping oil reserves, while in a lower-growth industry than healthcare, still average just under \$150,000 per year on average, according to Business Insider.

Rounding out the list were IT and marketing managers, financial and sales managers, lawyers and pharmacists.
